

Jesuits Open World's First High School for AIDS Orphans: St. Aloysius Gonzaga High School in Nairobi, Kenya



St. Al's school (above) serves the Kibera slums, home to more than one quarter of Nairobi's population. There are no residential buildings over a single story. The average home is 10 feet by 10 feet, housing five persons. Urban services such as water or sanitation are minimal.

St. Al's was co-founded in 2003 by Jesuit Terry Charlton and Christian Life Community. St. Al's is a Catholic school dedicated to serving AIDS-affected youth from the Kibera slum. It gives students hope for a better life by providing a college preparatory education and support to overcome the challenges of the loss of parents along with extreme poverty. \$750 per student per year covers the cost of the students' education, daily meals, and uniforms.

It is estimated that Kenya has more than 3 million AIDS orphans and that the number is steadily increasing. Roughly 1.5 square miles, the Kibera slum is home to 1 million people, 30,000 of whom are AIDS orphans of secondary school age. These children are not able to continue their education due to poverty, prohibitive costs, and a lack of accessible schools.

Our dream of a permanent school is quickly moving toward realization. The budgeted cost for the new 1-acre campus is an economical \$1 million. We plan to begin building Phase I in 2008 on land just a five-minute walk from Kibera. The building programs will increase enrollment from 196 to 420 students as well as provide labs for science and computers, a library, and other facilities.

Generous benefactors have contributed over \$500,000 towards the total cost of \$1 million. We hope to raise the remaining money in time to begin Phase II in late 2008. Our goal is to complete the building project by January 2009.
